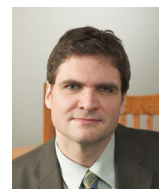
P3 *Clinical Supervision: An Essential Ingredient to Enhancing Treatment Outcome*

High-conflict client populations, such as those who are sexually violent, resistant, manipulative, and at times disturbing, present great challenges for both veteran as well as new therapists. This presentation focuses on enhancing treatment outcomes through the provision of high-quality supervision and ongoing consultation. The presentation offers theory and techniques of supervision to enhance client responsiveness, amend dynamic risk factors, and foster effective therapist style. Concepts and case examples highlight the importance of attunement, integration, transference, self-care, interpersonal neurobiological processes, and strength-based collaborative practice. Ethical and legal issues related to working with varied groups of sexual offenders and therapists are discussed. B1 *Hindsight or Mindsight: Shaping the Future of Sex Offender Management and Treatment*

Last year's CCOSO keynote speaker, Dr. Daniel Siegel, provided information about how the brain develops that can greatly enhance our understanding of our sex offender clients. B2 *1+1 ≠ 2: Recent Developments in Sexual Recidivism Actuarial Risk Assessment*

The use of actuarial risk instruments ("ARI") is now widely accepted in assessing the recidivism risk of sexual offenders. The scientific methods by which actuarial instruments have been developed have contributed to their aura of infallibility that has led some to accept their findings uncritically. However, interpreting simple raw scores obtained from sexual recidivism, ARI has become infinitely more complex as these measures have come under increased scientific scrutiny. Consumers of this information need to be informed of the limitations of results obtained from such instruments when rendering decisions that have enormous implications for liberty interests, public safety, and allocation of scarce resources such as designating high risk offender status, determining level of community supervision and the provisioning of treatment resources, and opining whether subjects meet the statutory defined risk criterion under involuntary civil confinement statutes.

B3 *Challenging the Concept of Dynamic Risk Factors*

Thinking about dynamic risk has been dominated by the classic distinction between static, stable and acute risk factors. Recent research has highlighted problems with this distinction. An alternative framework based on the concept of long-term vulnerability will be presented along with research indicating the greater predictive value of this approach. Change is then conceptualized in terms of the interaction between intentional processes and the individual's bio-psycho-social resources.

D2 *Safe Family Reunification When a Parent is the Molester*

Families in which molestation has occurred often want to reunify. This workshop will offer plans designed to maximize safety as reunification proceeds. Significant family dysfunctions must be addressed, communication improved, and safeguards instituted, in order for the family to heal. Should the offender have contact with only the non-offended children (rarely), what kinds of contact are appropriate and when? The need for coordination of the process will be stressed. It requires full family participation in various modalities, with emphasis on healthy rebonding and restructuring the ways the family operates. Exercises to assist in this process will be used in each module. Sex Offender Re-Entry Overcoming NIMBY through Education and Collaboration

When the public learns that a sex offender is moving into their neighborhood, they react with considerable fear, anxiety, anger and a feeling of helplessness about what they can do. Citizens contact their lawmakers and lawmakers pass "feel good" legislation in an attempt to appease their constituencies. Sadly, many of these reactions and subsequent laws follow from myths and misunderstandings about sex offenders and the NIMBY mentality takes over. This has a severe impact on successful sex offender re-entry. Through collaboration and community education, citizens learn that investing in offender success is in the best interest of public safety. This presentation will discuss strategies for conducting successful community education meetings as well as the benefit of collaborating with other agencies, the public and the news media.

Biography

Detective Robert A. Shilling is a 31 year veteran of the Seattle Police Department. He spent 20 years in the Sexual Assault and Child Abuse Unit and investigated hundreds of cases of sexual abuse. Detective Shilling established and then led the Seattle Police Department's Sex and Kidnapping Offender Detail for 17 years. This is the unit responsible for the community notification and education program. Detective Shilling has conducted over 500 sex offender community education meetings. In February of 2010, he was transferred to Homeland Security to manage a major multi-agency public safety project.

Detective Shilling's experience in conducting calm, informative and well-organized community education meetings is known internationally. As a result, he has been interviewed by news media from all over the world. He has done documentary specials with BBC and LWT television networks in England, the German Television Network, Courtroom TV, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and the ITC Television Network in the United Kingdom. Many daily newspapers in the United States, Canada, Germany, South Africa, Australia and Great Britain have interviewed him. Detective Shilling has appeared as a content expert regarding sex offenders on the "Montel Show," and NBC Dateline's "To Catch a Predator" series.

In March of 2000, Detective Shilling was appointed by the Secretary General of Interpol to the Interpol Specialist Group on Crimes against Children. In October 2010, he was elected by the 189 member countries as the Chair of the Interpol Specialists Group on Crimes against Children. Detective Shilling is the only municipal law enforcement officer in the United States to be part of this specialists group. As part of his Interpol duties, Detective Shilling authored the chapter on "Sex Offender Management" for the Interpol Handbook of Best Practices. This chapter includes a step by step guide on conducting successful sex offender community education meetings. Detective Shilling co-authored a chapter entitled, "Community Education and Collaboration: Working with the Community on a Complex Problem" in the book "The Prevention of Sexual Violence: A Practitioner's Sourcebook" published by NEARI Press. He is the

author of the chapter "Community Education" in the Washington State Model Policy for managing sex offenders. He is currently writing a book entitled "Sex Offender Management: A Guide for Law Enforcement and Probation and Parole Officers." Detective Shilling has written 12 pieces of sex offender legislation that have been passed into law in Washington State. He is called upon frequently to testify before the Washington State Legislature, and he has twice testified before Congress. Detective Shilling received a legislative proclamation for his testimony before the Minnesota Legislature and he's testified before the legislatures in Maine and Wisconsin.

Detective Shilling was appointed to the Twin Rivers Sex Offender Treatment Program Advisory Board and the King County Secure Community Transition Facility Advisory Board. He spent seven years as a voting member of the Washington State End of Sentence Review Committee. Detective Shilling lectures at colleges and universities in Washington State. He is frequently called upon to speak at national and international conferences. Detective Shilling is on the faculty of Fox Valley College and an instructor in the "Comprehensive Approach to Sex Offender Management."

In 1995, Detective Shilling was named police officer of the year for Washington State. In 1996, he was nominated for the International Association of Chiefs of Police/Parade Magazine law enforcement officer of the year award. In April 1997, Detective Shilling received the Sons of the American Revolution Law Enforcement Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2003 he was nominated for the Jefferson Award and in 2004 and 2006 was the recipient of the Seattle Police Department Public Service Award. In 2007 Detective Shilling was the recipient of the Phillip Russell Memorial Award from the Washington Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers, for "his myriad contributions to the field of sex offender management." Detective Shilling spent four years as a member of the national Board of Directors of the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers (ATSA).
