Dr. Gene Abel, MD

Qur keynote address will be delivered by Dr. Gene Abel, a distinguished board certified psychiatrist, physician and researcher, with a national and international reputation for diagnosing and treating sexual problems.

Having over 30 years in the field, Dr. Abel is currently the Medical Director at the Behavioral Medicine Institute in Atlanta, GA. In addition, Dr. Abel is a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry, who was for many years a professor at Columbia University School of Medicine. He currently teaches at both Morehouse School of Medicine and at Emory University School of Medicine.

Dr. Abel was honored with the 1990 Society for Sex Therapy and Research Masters and Johnson Award and the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abuser's 1991 Significant Achievement Award.

He has directed six National Institute of Mental Health research projects that have uncovered new information about the evaluation of sexual problems. Through these federal research projects he has developed effective treatment methods. Dr. Abel has published over 130 medical articles in scientific journals.

Paradigms of sexual abuse, treatment, and assessment are reviewed in the context of assessing and considering variables of sexual erotic development. P8 Why You Need To Understand Trauma to Treat Sex Offenders

This presentation will examine the complex relationship between early trauma and later sexual offending. It will make clear why new approaches such as the "good lives" model, although positive developments, will not increase treatment efficacy without therapeutic attention to trauma history. The relationship between "complex developmental PTSD" (DESNOS) and Hanson's "stable dynamic factors" will be described. Trauma treatment from a "phenomenological perspective" will be presented along with an explanation of how it works and how it can foster empathy. Some suggestions will be offered as to how you can integrate this approach with what you are already doing in sex offender treatment.

A2 Secondary Trauma

Secondary trauma is the short and long-term consequences of working with trauma victims/survivors and offenders and the painful and disruptive effect this can have on the worker. This can affect us physically, emotionally, behaviorally, cognitively—it can persist for months and sometimes years without effective intervention. With repeated exposure to traumatic imagery, workers may begin to incorporate an accumulation of clients' traumatic material into their own view of self and the world. This workshop will explore the causes and the symptoms from emotional to neurobiological. Effective interventions and protective measures will be discussed.

Evidence-based practices are the expected in the field, particularly with regard to the assessment and treatment of sexually abusive youth. Teen Triumph was the first residential treatment program, validation site in California for the newly validated and innovative risk assessment tool, *MEGA*. D3 Overview of Assessments Used in Evaluating Risk: Translating Risk Assessments into Treatment Planning and Community Supervision

Are all Sex Offenders dangerous predators? Learn about several of the assessment tools currently utilized in the field to assess risk. REGIONAL CHAPTERS/NETWORKS

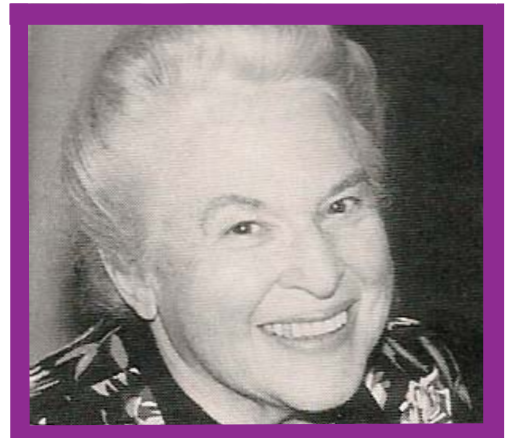

FAY HONEY KNOPP AWARD

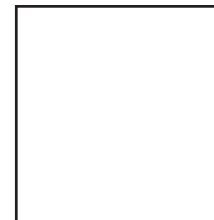
